BJA Grant Management Supports



RSAT Program Goals

Enhance the capabilities of state, local, and tribal governments to initiate or continue evidence-based substance use disorder (SUD) or co-occurring substance use and mental health disorder treatment programs in the nation's prisons and jails.

Increase the number of prisons and jails offering FDA-approved medications to incarcerated individuals with opioid use disorders (OUD).

Prepare individuals for reintegration into communities, including supporting continuity of care for OUD treatment and recovery supports prior to release.

Assist individuals through the reentry process by delivering community-based treatment, recovery, and other broad-based aftercare services to support successful reentry and continuity of care.



RSAT Program Objectives

Funds may be used to implement four types of programs/activities:

- Prison-based residential SUD treatment
- Jail-based residential SUD treatment
- Aftercare
- Jail-based pretrial SUD treatment



RSAT Program Requirements

Residential SUD treatment program in prisons

Engage individuals with SUD or co-occurring substance use and mental health disorders for a period of 6-12 months.

Require periodic and random drug testing of individuals while they are in the program and under community supervision.

Establish a therapeutic community (i.e., program participants are set apart from the general population).


Provide aftercare services.

RSAT Program Requirements

Residential SUD treatment programs in jails:

- Engage individuals with SUD or cooccurring substance use and serious mental health disorders for at least 3 months.
- Require periodic and random drug testing of individuals while they are in the program and under community supervision.
- Make every effort to establish a therapeutic community.
- Provide aftercare services.







RSAT Program Requirements

Aftercare Services

Case management and the full continuum of recovery and aftercare services to support people released from a residential SUD treatment program which may include human service and rehabilitation programs:

- education and job training
- parole supervision
- recovery or transitional housing
- peer support programs
- other recovery support services.



RSAT Program Requirements

Jail-based SUD treatment programs

Initiate or continue evidence-based SUD treatment programs (e.g., medication-assisted treatment) for individuals who were on such treatment upon arrival at the jail.

- Emphasis is on pretrial populations
- No requirements related to therapeutic community or minimum length of programming.

What is the Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) for State Prisoners Program?

The RSAT for State Prisoners Program's objectives are to enhance the capabilities of state, local, and Indian tribal governments to provide residential substance use disorder (SUD) treatment to people during detention or incarceration; prepare them for their reintegration into a community by incorporating reentry planning activities into their treatment programs; and assist them and their communities throughout the reentry process by delivering community-based treatment and other broad-based aftercare services.

What is the authorizing legislation for the RSAT State Prisoners Program?


The RSAT Program was created by the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 (Public Law 103-322) and codified at <u>34 U.S.C. § 10421 et. seq</u>.

What entity is eligible to receive funding?

Only states, as defined by this program, are eligible to apply and must designate a single State Administering Agency (SAA) that has authority to apply on their behalf. States often rely on a single entity within the state (e.g., SAA, Department of Corrections, Department of Public Safety, Governor's Office) to oversee the RSAT for State Prisoners Program and its subgrantees.

For purposes of this program, "state" means any state of the United States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

Eligible entities must provide a 25 percent cash or in-kind match to the grant award.







What does "therapeutic community" mean?

- Use of residential treatment facilities that are set apart from the general correctional population in either a separate facility or a dedicated housing unit that is used exclusively for RSAT and/or other SUD treatment programs.
- Jails that do not have the capacity to establish a therapeutic community are encouraged to group RSAT Program participants within the general correctional setting.



Is drug testing required for all individuals participating in prison, jail, and aftercare programs?

YES. Drug testing is required for individuals participating in any RSAT Program supported by RSAT for State Prisoners Program funds, as well as while participating in aftercare programs until they are no longer under the custody of the state.



Do RSAT for State Prisoners Program funds have to be used to support residential or jailbased SUD treatment programming?

YES. A state must use at least 10 percent of the total award to make subgrants to local correctional and detention facilities in the state (provided such facilities exist therein) for the purpose of assisting jail-based SUD treatment programs that are effective and sciencebased.



Can RSAT for State Prisoners Program funds be used to provide SUD treatment services to pretrial populations?

YES. RSAT for State Prisoners Program funds may be used to continue or initiate evidence-based SUD treatment to individuals detained by the jail pretrial as well as to support connecting these individuals to community-based treatment services.

Award Special Condition #46

"The recipient may not draw down any funds under this award until (1) the recipient submits a budget, budget narrative and programmatic narrative reflecting their full award amount via Programmatic Cost Grant Award Modification (GAM), (2) BJA approves the submission via Grant Award Modification (GAM), and (3) BJA has issued an Award Condition Modification (ACM) releasing this award condition. The recipient may obligate these funds and/or obligate or expend non-federal funds but, if done prior to the removal of this award condition, recipient accepts the risk that such obligations or expenditures may not be reimbursable to this award. Recipient should further be aware that the provisions found herein may be superseded by more restrictive award conditions otherwise placed upon this award."

GAM Step #3

- Attach the **Budget Detail Worksheet** and **Project Narrative** to the GAM.
- Add any other attachments, e.g., Indirect Cost Rate Agreement.
 - Subaward budget/narrative documents are **not** required.

NOTE:

- Make sure that your budget reflects the correct award dollar amount.
- Ensure you have uploaded the most recent version of your project narrative based on the award amount.
- Make sure you provide information in the justification section, not just "see attached documents".



Budget Reminders

Ensure the budget reflects the correct dollar amount for the award.

- The administrative costs should not exceed 10%
- The subaward costs should be reflected only in the subaward category (not in other line items).
- Any costs associated with the award, such as rent, laptops, etc. should be prorated to the RSAT award.
- 10% jail requirement.

Ensure your project narrative reflects activities which will occur based on the award amount.

 Include language regarding conducting drug screening, substance use disorder treatment, jail programming, aftercare, and data collection.

Allowable Costs

Can the RSAT Program funds be used to cover administrative costs associated with grants management?

Can RSAT Program funds be used for costs associated with travel?

Can RSAT Program funds be used to purchase items provided to individuals at reentry (e.g., reentry backpacks)?

Is the use of consultants or contractors to provide training allowable?



Match Required

- 25% cash or in-kind match
 - o "In-kind" match may be in the form of services, supplies, real property, and equipment.
- If an award recipient's proposed match exceeds the required match amount, according to the formula below, and OJP approves the budget, the total match amount in the approved budget becomes part of the project budget and subject to audit.
- "Match" funds may be used only for purposes that would be allowable for the federal funds.

NOTE: BJA will waive the requirement for matching funds (including in-kind) for all awards made to American Samoa, Guam, U.S. Virgin Islands, and Northern Mariana Islands.



Local Jail Requirement

Must allocate at least 10 percent of the total state allocation to local correctional facilities, provided such facilities exist

Funds must be used for either of the following:

- Residential SUD treatment programs in jails.
- Initiate or continue evidence-based SUD treatment programs in pretrial populations.







Wyoming Honor Conservation Camp (WHCC): Male Intensive Treatment Unit, Wyoming Department of Corrections FY2023 RSAT funded program

OVERVIEW OF PROGRAM

The RSAT program in the WHCC Male Intensive Treatment Unit (WHCC-MITU) was established in January of 2010 and was formerly operated at the Wyoming Medium Correctional Institution (WMCI). The WHCC-MITU can accommodate 64 men and is designed to operate as a modified therapeutic community using a holistic treatment approach. Like the WHCC Female Intensive Treatment Unit (WHCC-FITU), the WHCC-MITU program is in a unit separate from the general population and is certified under the Wyoming Department of Health's substance abuse certification standards.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA, SCREENING/ASSESSMENT, AND TREATMENT PLANNING All individuals entering with the Wyoming Department of Corrections (WDOC) are assessed upon intake to determine if they have a substance use disorder (SUD) treatment need. WDOC utilizes the Addiction Severity Index (ASI) and American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) criteria to determine the level of need for each individual. Those with an ASAM score of 3.5 are eligible to go to the Intensive Treatment Unit (ITU) programs. Eligibility is also dependent upon the individual's classification score, mental health needs, and other specialty medical needs.

Other routes to RSAT program treatment include stipulations from the parole board, staff

What we can learn from this RSAT program

The WDOC responds to the cultural and religious beliefs of indigenous people who are incarcerated within its facilities through the inclusion of sweat lodges, smudge ceremonies, as well as recovery curricula and groups designed specifically for them.



RSAT-TTA Fidelity Assessment

The outcome of the Fidelity Assessment (FA) process is a report that scores how closely the RSAT Program aligns with the PPGs, identifies areas of strengths and weaknesses, and provides individualized recommendations for training and technical assistance (TTA).






