
Broad Range of Harm Reduction Services

Health Equity & Social Determinates of Recovery



Largest drivers of health costs & negative outcomes are related to food & housing security, access to quality care, and environmental stressors.

(Marmot & Allen, 2014 & National Academies of Sciences, Engineering & Medicine, 2021)



Harm Reduction Continuum: Priorities, Policies, Perceptions

Goal: Shift from eliminating drug use to reducing mortality risks

Objectives: Evidence-based harm reduction: syringe services programs (SSP), fentanyl test strips (FTS), safer use supplies & information

Goal: Confront racial equity issues related to drug policy

Objectives: Low threshold services, reach into communities & reach out to groups, easy access, to care, screening, prevention education & relapse response





Exclusions & Inclusions in SAMHSA-funded Programs

Includes

- ✓ Safer use/sex supplies!
 - Fentanyl test strips
 - Syringes, smoking supplies
- ✓ Wound care & naloxone
- ✓ Buprenorphine after overdose
- ✓ Can support mobile services
- ✓ Overdose Prevention Education and Naloxone Distribution (OEND)
- ✓ Peer support services
- ✓ Referrals to safety net services


Excludes

- Safe consumption sites (SCS)
 - > NYC SCS are up & running
 - Rhode Island law permits them
- Anything violating state laws
- Food & housing
- Cannabis
- Treatment Services
- Purchasing vans



Low Threshold Model of Access to Care

- Abstinence not required
- Or commitment to treatment
- Promote safer use
- Trauma-informed, no cost
- Safer use supplies, syringes
- Testing for HIV and viral hepatitis, pre-exposure prophylaxis (PreP)
- Immediate access to MOUDS
- Mobile & drop-in services, OEND
- Street outreach, peer staff
- In & by underserved communities
- Integrated into primary care







Safer Use Examples: Reducing Risk Behaviors

Especially important for those at high risk of relapse

- 1. Never use alone.
- 2. Never use behind a locked door seconds count.
- 3. Never mix substances (including alcohol).
- 4. Know your source careful when you don't (a test shot or dose).
- 5. Mindful of tolerance start low and go slow after periods of abstinence.
- 6. Locate overdose prevention emergency services near you.
- 7. Never share equipment: cookers, pipes, straws, cottons, tie-offs, or water.
- 8. Have naloxone on hand.
- 9. MAT can help you stay alive on the outside.
- 10. If you must share a syringe, rinse it twice with bleach then water



Collaboration in the time of COVID

Resources for pre-release planning and post-release linkages to continuing care

- PreP, HCV testing, linkage to treatment & prevention
- Post release OEND
- Harm reduction vending machines w/free supplies
- Safer use education & supplies
- Lower post-release fentanyl death/FTS
- Low threshold relapse mitigation
- Peer recovery support services

Ask partners if they are submitting a proposal NOW!



Local Drug Threats Information

Warnings about 'overdose outbreaks, local overdose prevention Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program (ODMAP) data.
Closest HIDTA (High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area) office.
Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) National Drug Threat Assessment : information about most regions of the US.
State and local law enforcement data on recent seizures available.
Fatal / non-fatal overdose info including local and statewide overdose data dashboards.
Warnings: counterfeit pills containing fentanyl or meth , adulterated illicit opioids and cocaine, and increased potency.
Harm reduction programs that test local illicit drugs, provide testing supplies and information to people who use drugs.


